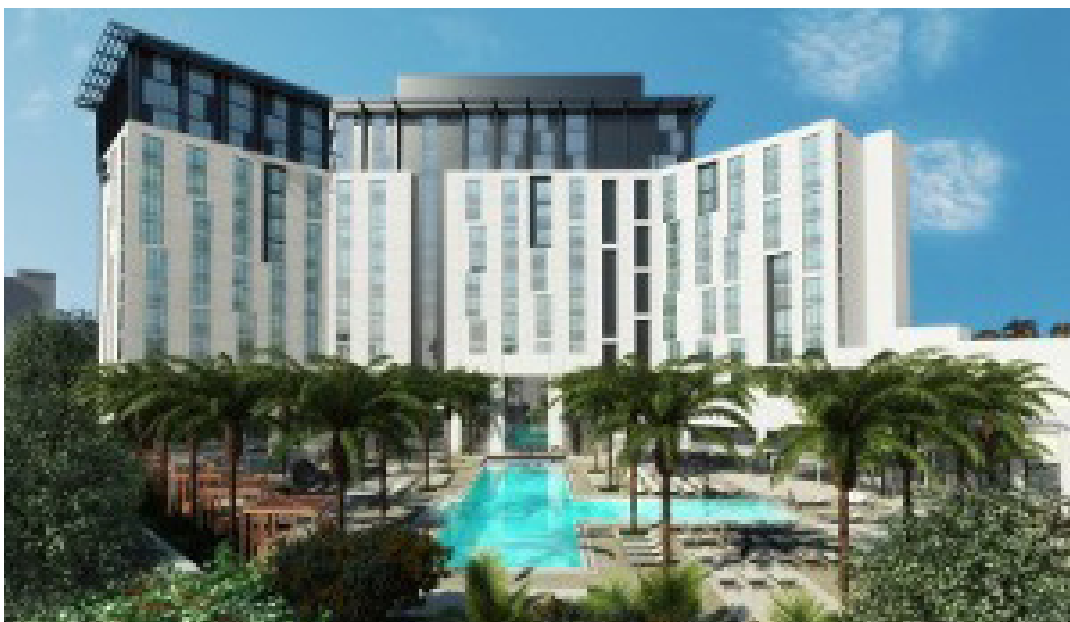

Greetings from the NAME Foundation. This belated first (and final) Newsletter of 2021 comes at the end of another strange and interesting year. With the pandemic, the continued opioid epidemic (can we call this a pandemic too?), and issues related to workforce shortages within FP, it has been a challenge to produce just one Newsletter this year.



The 2021 was again held at the Hilton-West Palm Beach, the same venue that hosted the 2018 Annual Meeting.

2021 NAME Annual Meeting – Back In-Person (Mostly)

A huge shout-out to the NAME Leadership and all of those responsible for putting-on a very successful, educational, and smooth-running combined LIVE and virtual meeting this past October. Special thanks to Dee McNally, Tara Snetten, Program Chair Jennifer Hammers, and IT-guru Louis Jares, for all of their efforts which made the meeting a huge success.

The meeting once again took place in West Palm Beach, FL, from October 15-19, 2021, and featured nearly 80 oral presentations and close to 100 poster presentations! Most of the talks were presented LIVE, but several occurred virtually via pre-recorded presentations. These worked quite well, with little if any technical difficulties noted. A

total of 285 attendees registered for and attended the meeting. In addition, there were 23 vendor booths, with 38 vendor registrants, for a total of 323 registrants. The Board of Directors meeting took place virtually prior to the actual meeting, but the NAME Business Meetings occurred as usual during the meeting, with no major issues of contention to report on. Considering the pandemic, the meeting was very well-attended.



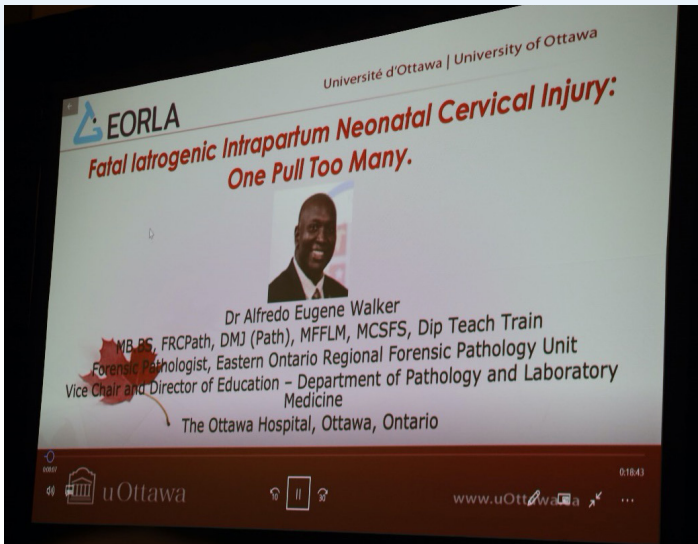

Each session included a question and answer period.

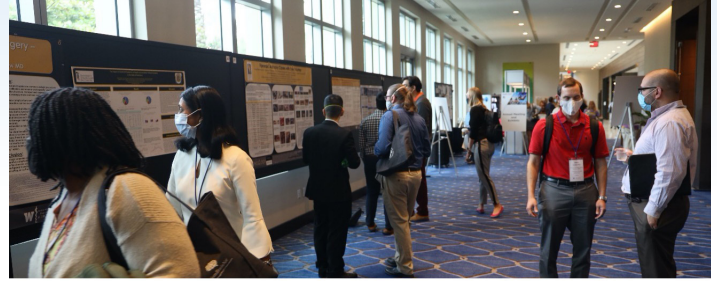

POSTER SESSIONS

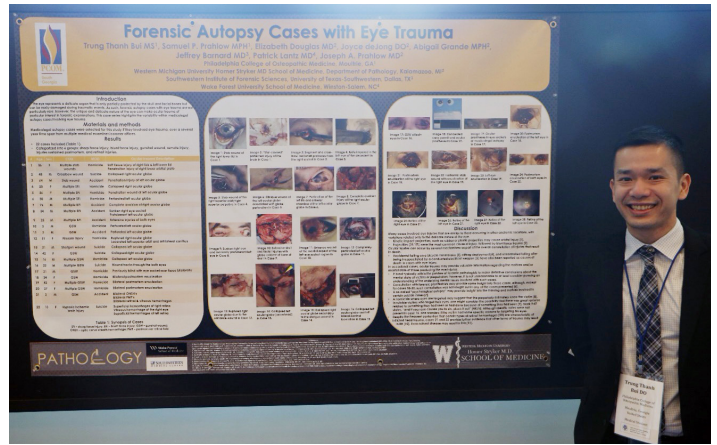

In addition to dedicated time where presenters were required to be at their posters, the posters were available for viewing all day for each of the 3 poster day sessions.



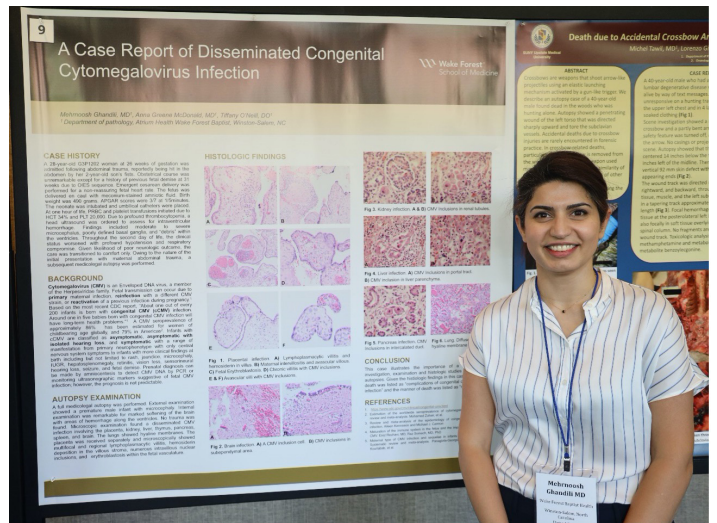
As usual, the poster sessions were well-attended and well-received.

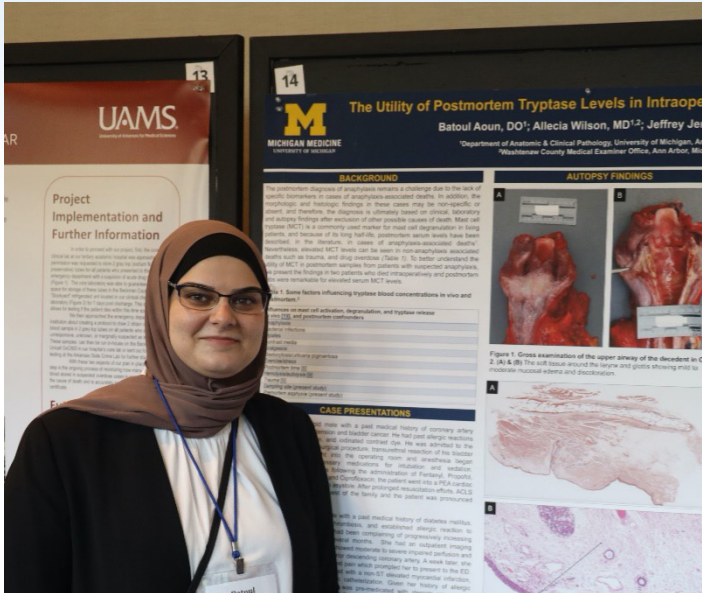

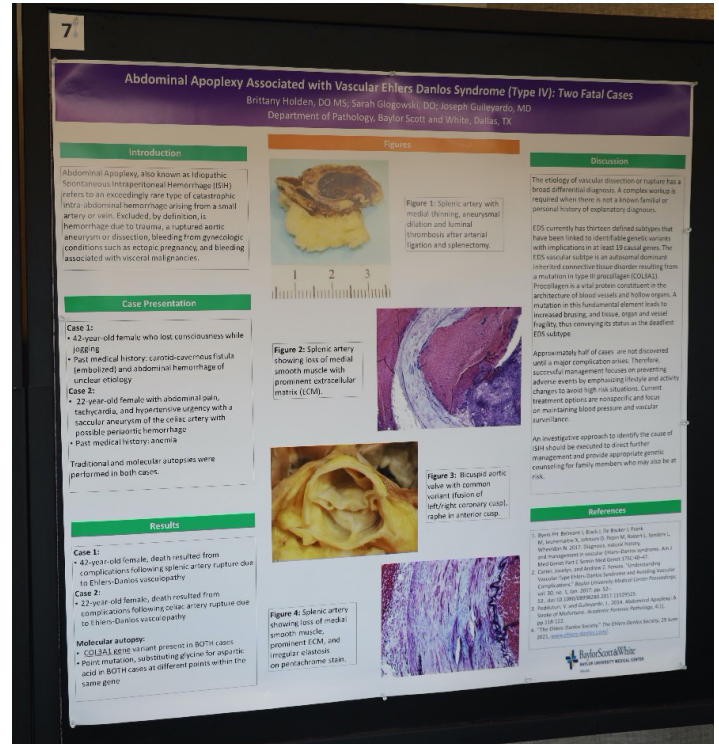

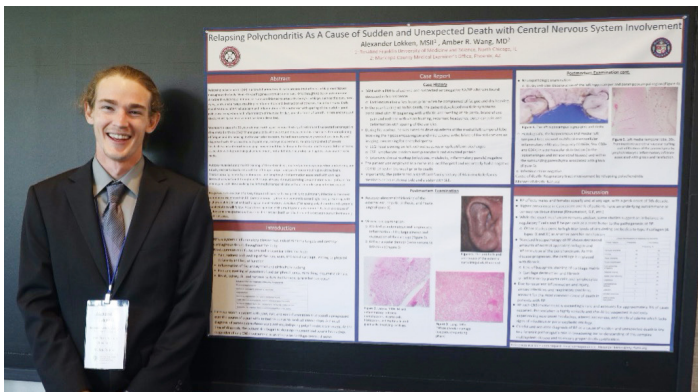

NAME Foundation Events at the 2021 Annual Meeting

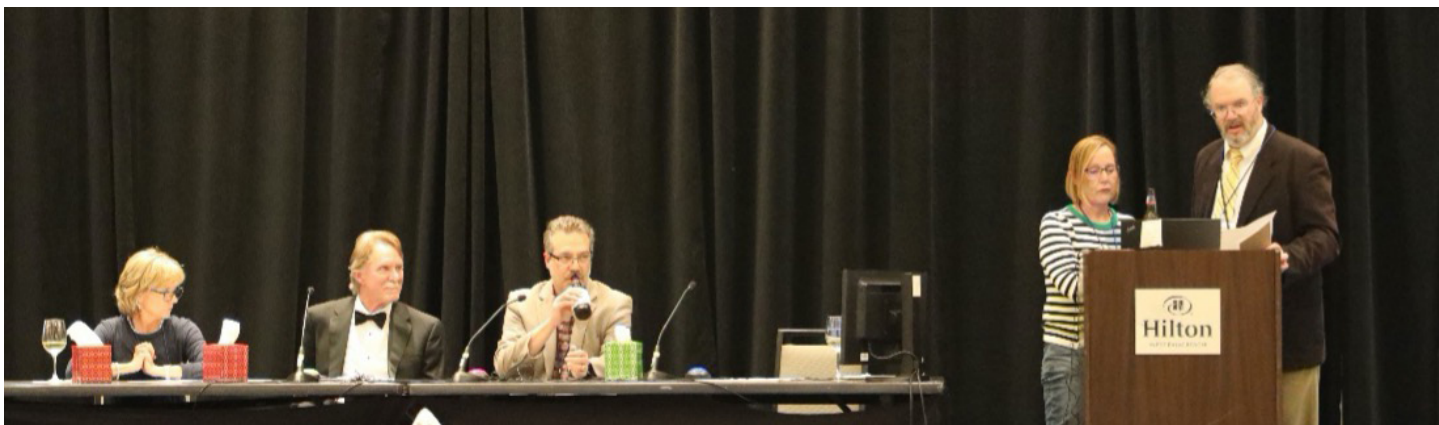

Message from the 2021 NAME President



NAME 2021 President Jim Gill, MD

Dear NAME Members,

Our main focus this year was workforce (Go MJ!). Given the shortage of forensic pathologists, NAME made a major push in several areas to help get more people interested in forensic pathology. Some other recent NAME Projects/Accomplishments include:

1. In October in West Palm, FL, we had our first in-person annual meeting since 2020. There were over 300 registrants and all the presentations were recorded so they can be viewed later for CME by members who could not attend. The late Dr. John Edland was honored for his investigation of the deaths at the Attica prison uprising. His wife and three daughters attended the meeting and each received a commemorative coin. One daughter spoke about her father and it is anticipated that the recording will be available on the NAME website.
2. Workforce:
 - NAME-Edland Coin: NAME awarded a commemorative coin to graduating pathology residents who entered FP fellowships this year. It honors John Edland who investigated the Attica Prison deaths (see above).
 - More than 20 NAME members made NEPRIS presentations about FP careers to High School and Middle School students. NEPRIS connects teachers and students.
 - We have created videos of members on how they got interested in forensic pathology which are available on our website and YouTube.
 - We have started a virtual lecture series for medical students. More than 200 attended the first one.
3. NAME has been working with the CFSO on funding for NamUs and support for forensic pathology fellowship salaries and a loan forgiveness program.
4. NRMP Match: NAME is sponsoring a national match for FP fellowships beginning in July 2024. Over 90% of the program positions have chosen to participate.
5. New Meeting Awards:
 - The Randy Lee Hanzlick, M.D. Persistence Award was created as a Presidential award for Outstanding Mid-Career Leadership by a NAME Member.
 - The Sudden Unexplained Death in Childhood (SUDC) Foundation Award is for the Best Platform presentation at the annual meeting in Pediatric Death Investigation. This award is sponsored by the SUDC Foundation.
 - Edward J. Barbieri Forensic Toxicology Award for the Best Platform presentation at the annual meeting in Forensic Toxicology. This award is sponsored by the Fredric Rieders Family Foundation.

6. **Liaisons:** NAME has established liaisons with the National Medical Association (Kristinza W. Giese) and the American Board of Forensic Anthropology (MariaTeresa Tersigni-Tarrant).
7. NAME supported the Pathology Section of the National Medical Association to have its First Annual Forensic Symposium. The symposium included a Forensic panel with NAME members Dr. Angela Baldwin, Dr. Ken Obenson, Dr. Sasha Breland, Dr. Jan Gorniak, and Dr. Alfredo Walker. Thanks to Dr. Kristinza W. Giese, our NMA liaison.
8. **NAME-L, NAME-E, NAME-C:**
- NAME-E: NAME created a pilot NAME-E for students, residents, fellows, and recently-board-certified FPs along with fellowship program directors.
 - NAME-C: NAME has developed NAME-C for chiefs to discuss personnel matters, etc.
 - NAME-L: Is undergoing some logistical changes.
9. **Position Papers and Statements:**
- The following position papers are in progress:
- Disaster-Related (weather) Deaths
 - The Second Autopsy
 - The Role of Pathologist Assistants
10. **NAME's Protocols for Interagency Interactions in Mass Fatality Incidents committee** updated the NAME's Mass Fatality plan.
11. **Educational Activates Committee:** The EAC had a very successful year with excellent teaching cases. There is a page on the website that has archived all of the cases. The EAC also did profiles of 13 forensic pathologists.
12. **I&A Committee:** Since 2015, the number of accredited offices has increased from 85 (77 full accreditation, 8 provisional) to 98 (92 full accreditation, 6 provisional). The population served by NAME accredited offices has increased to 129,631,000 (40% of US).
13. **NAME Member Assistance and Education:**
- NAME provided templates for obtaining access to the electronic medical record and for state legislation to allow for per diems with a valid out-of-state license to work in another state for a limited basis with having to obtain a license.
 - Our monthly "5 Bullets" helped to keep members up to date.
 - The NAME Bioterrorism and Infectious Disease committee provided periodic literature reviews of recent Covid-19 articles
 - NAME networked with the Society of Cardiovascular Pathology who provided excellent cardiovascular pathology talks to the membership.
 - NAME has worked with on a grant that will help us fund a virtual grand rounds with CME and free toxicology seminars.
14. **The NAME Web Site** has been updated:
- There is a NAME Dropbox that has images, presentations, sample curricula, sample applications to start a forensic pathology fellowship, and other teaching materials.
 - There is a new detailed listing of all the forensic pathology fellowship programs that can be updated by the program directors.
15. **2022 Interim Meeting:** It will be virtual and not coincide with the AAFS meeting.
16. **2022 Annual NAME meeting, in-person in Dallas:** October 14-18, 2022.
- Thanks to all of the Committee Chairs and Members who participated in this very productive year! The EC was quite busy—thanks go to Sally Aiken, Kathy Pinneri, Scott Denton, Mary Ann Sens, Joyce deJong, Kent Harshbarger, and Keith

Pinckard. And of course, special thanks to Dee McNally and Tara Snethen.

Both organizations are working on this issue; however, as this topic is of great importance, and there are other pressing matters currently being addressed in NAME, the discussions regarding a merger remain “tabled” at the moment.
